### No Slipping ~ No Kidding!

If you've cut circles before, you've probably traced a bowl, a plate or a dish. The problem is, your circles aren't always round! They certainly don't look like each other. Cutting consistent circles are hard to do~!



Get-a-Grip Material

But my Complete Circle Templates make it easy! Especially those lofty fabrics like polar fleece, guilted fabric and Insul-brite or slippery like Oil Cloth. The 'get a grip' grabs it all! The 8" makes a great baby bib or drool bib. Add Insul-Brite and whip up some cute Pocket Potholders or Pie Crust Potholders. They come in a number of sizes but if you need another, just ask!

Double Pocket Potholder Directions on Potholder Video



Pie Crust Potholder Directions & on Potholder Video



Baby Bib/Drool Bib (Directions on Video Pt 1)

#### **Double Pocket Pot Holder -**

These potholders are perfect for a quick gift for family and friends or just to make for yourself. With the Complete 8" Circle Template, they're quick & easy!

#### You need:

1 piece Insul-Brite 8 1/2" x 8 1/2" 2 pieces cotton fabric: 8 1/2" x 8 1/2" each

Pockets:

2 pieces cotton fabric: 8 1/2" x 8 1/2" each 2 pieces felt or batting 8 1/2" x 4 1/4"

Binding: 1 package Double Fold Binding


Basic Sewing Supplies: Sewing Machine, Iron, Pins, etc.

Optional: Basting Spray, metallic Sharpie or chalk pencil, fabric glue, plastic clothes pins

#### Let's get started

#### Laying out Your Fabrics:

Watch the video at www.Youtube.com/Lindavideos to see how 2 options for cutting with the template! Cut front, back, pockets, and batting at the same time. Cut Insul-Bright separately.



**Marking your Template** If template doesn't have hash marks, find center of template and place 4 marks using a metallic Sharpie. If you don't

want marks permanent, use a chalk pencil.



**Pockets** 

Take 1 pocket 8 1/2" x 8 ½" and fold in half. Finger press. Open up and place 1 batting 8 1/2" x 4 ¼" on top. Line this up to the fold.



Repeat for other pocket.

#### Optional:

Use basting spray to adhere layers.



Sewing:

At sewing machine, topstitch in place ¼" along folded edge. Do this for both pockets.

(I used Martelli's SND Seam Guide Foot set at ¼".)





**Layering Fabrics:** 

Take back fabric and front fabric and place wrong sides together. Stack pockets on top with topstitching edges perfectly in center with a 1" space.





Lavering Template on Fabrics: Place Circle Template on top of layers so the hash mark is perfectly

centered between the 1" space between pockets. Use your mat to help line up.



**Cutting Layers:** 

Watch video to see 2 options for cutting. Cut cotton & batting layers. Not used to a rotary cutter? Cut back & front fabrics 1st then cut pockets.

#### **Cutting Insul-Brite:**

Cut 1 circle out of Insul-Brite.







**Pinning Layers:** 

Pin in place. This shows the back piece using Insul-Brite rather than fabric.



Stitch Layers: Stitch close to edge before adding binding.

Cutting....



Attach binding in whatever method you like by hand or by machine, with a straight stitch or zig-zag. Or cheat by using fabric glue & plastic clothespins to hold in place. Topstitch for a nice, finished look.

Place back fabric down wrong side up then

Insul-Brite then front layer right side up.

Or use Insul-Brite in place of back fabric.





Add loop for hanging.









Use ric rac to create a cute Pie Crust look to your Potholder. Steam a Seam or any peel off tape helps to hold everything in place. Stitch all of the layers down and then add a binding.

#### **Care & Handling of Template:**

- The Get a Grip material must be kept free of accumulation of dirt, thread, etc.
- Store template with Get a Grip face up or in accompanying bag. Get a Grip will stick to painted surfaces.
- My favorite cleaning method is to lightly press the area with a cheap piece of packing tape.



## **CUTTING CIRCLES**







2. Cut off



Perfect circles every time

Sure beats a bowl, a plate or a dish!!!

## **CUTTING SIDES FOR CIRCLES**

- Radius
- Diameter
- Circumference

This was found on the web:

Use the formula.


The circumference of a circle is found with the formula  $C = \pi^* d = 2^* \pi^* r$ .

Thus pi equals a circle's circumference divided by its diameter.

Plug your numbers into a calculator:

the result should be roughly 3.14

We can use Pi ..... or we can just grab a tape measure and run it around the edge of the template or just cut a strip a bit longer & shorten it as we go!



## BASIC CIRCLE BASKET

Tall Circle Short Circle Bigger or Smaller Nested Fold Over Straps or Handles

# BASIC CIRCLE BASKET





1. Cut 2 fabric circles & 1 "headliner' foam circle using the Circle Template.



2. Cut 2 fabric rectangles & 1 foam rectangle.

For rectangle length, use a tape measure around the edge of template

Decide the height you'd like and add 1".



3. Stitch foam to 1 circle. This will make everything easier later.



4. Stitch foam to rectangle on bottom & top for security measures.





5. Starting at side seam, sew foam fabric rectangle to foam fabric circle but stop about an inch from seam.



 Take a look at how much overlap you have.



 Trim excess, leaving enough for a consistent seam with rectangle.



Check amount & trim if necessary.



 Stitch both base and side seams. Check that everything is lined up and joined nicely.




It's starting to take shape.



11. Sew circle lining to rectangle.



12. Cut off excess leaving extra fabric for turning area.



Stitch side together leaving an opening for turning. Backstitch!



 With right sides together, stuff outside into inside.



With free arm, stitch inside to outside.



 Carefully, turn right sides out.



16. Take your time; eventually it'll pop through!



 Finger press the opening area closed. You can sew by hand, machine or use a glue or <u>Sealah</u>.



 Smooth everything in place then topstitch along the top edge.



The foam gives it a nice shape.
